



RACIAL AND ETHNIC BREAKDOWN OF FIRMS




WOMEN-OWNED FIRMS




REVENUE GROWTH BY COMPANY SIZE




THE IMPACT OF CORONAVIRUS

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic in early 2020, we have seen a dramatic impact on small business owners as they navigate business closures, furloughs, and more. We conducted the 2020 ICIC Health Crisis Survey to understand and examine how the crisis has affected their businesses, their employees, and their ability to access to capital.

We know that the small business community, particularly those in underserved communities, has been hit the hardest by the pandemic. Now, more than ever, they need access to capital, one-on-one coaching, and capacity-building education, the fundamental components of the ICCC program.

This year in particular, we worked with some of the most vulnerable businesses in our communities, and invited our alumni to participate again as part of our commitment to provide the small business community with the tools and resources to lead, survive, and thrive during these uncertain times.

BUSINESS IMPACT DUE TO HEALTH CRISIS







INITIATIVE FOR A COMPETITIVE INNER CITY (ICIC)

2020 ICCC IMPACT OVERVIEW Established in 1994 by Harvard Business School Professor Dr. Michael E. Porter, ICIC is a national nonprofit that *drives inclusive economic* prosperity in under-resourced communities through innovative research and programs to create jobs, income, and wealth for local residents.

INNER CITY CAPITAL CONNECTIONS (ICCC) PROGRAM

ICCC launched in 2005 to help small- and medium-sized businesses in under-resourced communities build capacity for sustainable long-term growth. Since that time, the program has grown dramatically, and in 2020 served 1,220 small business owners in 17 cohorts across the country.

2020 PROGRAM FOCUS

The ICCC program pivoted to a fully virtual learning model and adapted its curriculum to help businesses survive, recover, and grow by prioritizing the following:

- Business Recovery Strategies
- One-on-One Coaching
- Capital Relief Solutions
- Community Building
- Networking and Peer-to-Peer Learning
